Let's make that our mission rather than getting distracted by all of the other things that scream for our attention...

A NOTE FROM MARY



I often pray for eyes open enough to see God at work. It is a recurring theme in my life, one I need God's help with, particularly since my type-A self can get very focused on tasks and needs. In Bible study vesterday, we talked briefly about distractions and how often we get caught up in things that have little or no eternal significance. I confess that too often my time is spent on other things. Sometimes those things are not bad things, sometimes they might even be necessary things, but often they are not significant things in terms of God's kingdom.

The past couple of weeks I have been searching out a new car to replace one that was totaled. I have spent some time praying that God would show me just the right car. But I have spent many more hours researching, comparing, test driving, and comparing different mpg's, mileage, reviews and reliability. It has been all-consuming and emotionally and intellectually exhausting. And it has become a distraction.

Yes, reliable transportation is important, however, my confidence in the future doesn't come from the reliability of a car. Yes, all those details I was worried about matter, however, they do not have eternal significance. And, in the end, it feels like I've wasted a lot of time that could have been spent in ways that are significant: time with my children, time alone with my God, and a mind and heart focused on seeing God at work around me. When I set the distractions aside, I am reminded that God has provided for me the ability to purchase a car and even to have options of what kind. I am reminded of His safekeeping during an accident. And I am reminded that there are those who are dealing with real problems and hurts so much bigger than one damaged car. And, once again, my eyes are opened.
